Alexander Weekend Pre-Party


January 29, 2011




March 25-27, 2011

Ten years ago (from November 2-4, 2001) the Palm Springs Preservation Foundation celebrated the "Great Alexander Weekend." In conjunction with the 2001 weekend, PSPF published a tribute journal entitled *When Mod Went Mass: A Celebration of Alexander Homes*. The 2001 weekend and tribute journal raised public awareness of the seminal role played by the Alexander Construction Company and modernist architects Bill Krisel and Don Wexler in the creation of Palm Springs' "built environment."

In celebration of the 10th Anniversary of the 2001 Alexander Weekend, a more scholarly tribute journal, *The Alexanders: A Desert Legacy*, was written by PSPF board member James R. Harlan. The 2011 Alexander Weekend festivities included a free lecture and two days of house tours (featuring 22 homes built by the Alexander Construction Company). In all, Alexander Weekend was attended by more than 1,000 enthusiastic lovers of modernist residential architecture. A special treat was the participation of Jill Alexander Kitnick who made opening remarks at the weekend's Kick-off Lecture and Panel Discussion. Alexander Weekend 2011 was wholly funded by PSPF, private donations and 15 generous business sponsors.
