## PS Modern Committee can help

In the past year, with direction from City
Council and guidance from the Palm Springs
Modern Committee, the Town & Country
Center has been physically stabilized and
secured from vandalism by owner Grit
Development. However, we're concerned that
it will still be many years before Grit obtains
sufficient funds to restore the property.

Right now, the city is in negotiations with Grit to settle its 1090 issues. We believe the Council must include the Town & Country Center in this settlement. To be clear, we cannot expect, nor do we want, the City to be responsible for restoring the property. Instead, were the City to acquire the Town & Country Center, it should move rapidly to sell it to investors committed to restoring and integrating it into our vibrant downtown. We know there's buyer interest because several

potential investors have approached the T& CC's owners in recent years, but their offers have not been accepted.

The Palm Springs Modern Committee pledges to help the City find an appropriate buyer; then, if requested, aid in the property's restoration.

We feel this is one of the few paths that can be taken to successfully save and properly restore the Town & Country Center.
